Course description:

This course provides the solid foundation necessary for academic writing. Topics include formats, literature reviews, citations, problem statements, research proposals, research questions, hypotheses, critiques of journal articles, evaluation of dissertations and dissertation abstracts, and writing for journals. The course is completed when the student, after completing all prior assignments, submits a finished article to an academic journal.

Course Prerequisites: It is suggested that this course be taken early in the student's program.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Synthesize professional writing techniques and mechanical skills to construct a scholarly and professional academic journal article utilizing APA (American Psychological Association 5th Edition—most recent edition) style and format. (Program Outcomes 1.1, 1.2, 2.2, 3.3)
- 2. Compose an original, clear, and concise research proposal containing the following components: a succinct executive summary, problem statement, hypothesis and/or objective, work plan, and summary. (Program Outcomes: 1.2, 2.2, 3.1, 3.3)
- 3. Critically analyze professional journal articles, dissertations/dissertation abstracts, and research studies and literature. (Program Outcomes: 1.1, 1.2, 3.1, 3.3)
- 4. Compile related professional and research literature using electronic information databases. (Program Outcomes: 1.1, 1.2, 3.3)
- 5. Identify and examine the ethical issues of professional business writing and research; apply ethical business writing standards to your own professional writing in a manner that is free of bias and opinion as well as plagiarism. (Program Outcomes: 1.2, 2.2, 3.1, 5.1)

Assignment #1.2

Find one (1) article from peer reviewed journals in your area of interest. The professor will provide you with feedback each week so you may continue to improve in thinking, conceptualizing, and writing.

Submit a 4-5 (double spaced) page article critique in form of a well-written, APA formatted essay using the following discussion checklist:

- Is the article/essay's title a clear depiction of its content? Why or why not?
- How qualified is the author to write about the subject matter?
- Was this article peer-reviewed?
- What is the purpose of the essay? Is it stated clearly?
- Identify the problem statement in the essay. Does the introduction and conclusion focus

			 clearly on the problem statement? Are statements of facts (beyond common street facts) supported by appropriate citations in the text or references? Which ideas/themes in the essay need further development? Which ideas are practical enough to be implemented in a business setting? Which ones are rather impractical? Why? Does the essay have a logical progression? Is it easy to follow and understand? Why or why not? Does the essay contain discursive or irrelevant themes or sections? What are they? Is the work biased in any way? How? In what way(s) will this article contribute to your research? Library:

All resources in Argosy University's online collection are available through the Internet. The campus librarian will provide students with links, user IDs, and passwords.

<u>Library Resources</u>: Argosy University's core online collection features nearly 21,000 full-text journals and 23,000 electronic books and other content covering all academic subject areas including Business & Economics, Career & General Education, Computers, Engineering & Applied Science, Humanities, Science, Medicine & Allied Health, and Social & Behavior Sciences. Many titles are directly accessible through the Online Public Access Catalog at http://library.argosyu.edu/misc/onlinedblist.html.

In addition to online resources, Argosy University's onsite collections contain a wealth of subject-specific research materials searchable in the Online Public Access Catalog. Catalog searching is easily limited to individual campus collections. Alternatively, students can search combined collections of all Argosy University Libraries. Students are encouraged to seek research and reference assistance from campus librarians.

<u>Information Literacy</u>: Argosy University's Information Literacy Tutorial was developed to teach students fundamental and transferable research skills. The tutorial consists of five modules where students learn to select sources appropriate for academic-level research, search periodical indexes and search engines, and evaluate and cite information. In the tutorial, students study concepts and practice them through interactions. At the conclusion of each module, they can test their comprehension and receive immediate feedback.
