Course Description:

In this course, we will examine common ethical issues that arise in the course of psychotherapy, assessment, and general therapeutic practices. By the end of this course students should be familiar with the ethics code, as well as how to place that code into a meaningful context within the therapeutic setting. Attention will also be placed on the cultural aspects of ethics, as well as ethical situations regarding children and families. The course format consists of weekly contact. Students are required to log on the course's website and post responses on the discussion board three times per week. Assignments, exams, and papers are to be submitted to the instructor via email.

Course Objectives:

The primary goal of this course is to examine common ethical issues that face psychologists. Areas of concentration will include:

- Understanding the APA Ethics Code
- Meaning of Informed Consent
- Suicide Assessment
- Research and Ethics
- Special Issues of Ethics and Minors

Methods of Instruction:

This course in conducted using an online format. Active participation (e.g. posting on the discussion board) is required at least three times per week. Weekly lectures and discussion questions will be posted, and assignments as indicated in the syllabus. All exams, assignments, and papers are due to the professor via email no later than midnight of their respective due date. No late work will be accepted without prior permission from the instructor.

Content Area:

*Please begin reading The Spirit Catches You and You Fall Down (Fadiman), as we will be discussing it in the last week of the term, and it will be the basis for your final paper. Read this book at your own pace, but finish it by week 14 of the course.

C = 70 - 79 Student participated in discussions in >70% of online class sessions; comments/questions demonstrate a surface level understanding of course topics

F = <70 Student participated in <70% of online class sessions; comments/questions did not demonstrate an understanding of course topics, or **student did not participate** in class discussions.

Criteria for Assignments

Grade

A = 90+ Paper is well thought out and provides **excellent** coverage of material

B = 80 - 89 Paper is well thought out, but is missing one component of APA format OR coverage of material is only **adequate**

C = 70 - 79 Insufficient number of references provided AND **limited** coverage

F = <70 Paper is disorganized AND coverage is not adequate format, or there is evidence of **plagiarism**, or paper not submitted
