COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Title: FP6030 Research and Evaluation –sections OLA, OLB, OLC

Term: Summer 2007 (5/7/07 - 6/27/07)

Course Description:

This course is designed to provide a graduate-level survey of the fundamentals of research design and methodology as it pertains to psychological research. Included in this course is a brief review of statistical methods utilized in research. Students will learn about the various methods of experimental design for both quantitative and qualitative research, as well as sampling, analysis, and interpretation of results. Cultural and ethical issues related to research will also be explored.

Course Objectives:

As a result of the material covered in this survey course, students will develop the ability to scrutinize research from a critical perspective, and to evaluate the validity, value, and viability of research claims and studies. Students will establish the necessary understanding of underlying research concepts in order to develop the following skills:

- 1) formulate research hypotheses and experimental designs
- 2) read and interpret statistical analysis of research data
- 3) discern the differences between different experimental designs, both qualitative and quantitative
- 4) evaluate the quality of existing psychological and forensic research studies
- 5) identify the cultural and ethical implications of research methods and outcomes

Method of Instruction:

This course is taught in an online format that involves posted lecture material, discussion groups, and assignments. Online course curriculum will be presented on the Argosy Internet platform. Since online discussion is the heart of effective online learning, students are expected to post to the discussion board to demonstrate their full engagement with the material (a minimum of three times per week). Assignments should be emailed to the instructor at the above email address and are due by 5pm on their respective due dates. No late work will be accepted without prior permission from the instructor.

Course Requirements:

Reading: Chapters from the textbook will be assigned, in addition to lecture notes and other articles posted on eCollege. Students will also be reading additional related material to complete course assignments.

Class Participation: The discussion forum is the place where we can come together to share ideas, questions, and perspectives on the course material, and otherwise interact with the concepts being presented. Because this is a strictly online course, it is expected that all students participate in the discussion postings each week (an Argosy requirement), posting a minimum of three times per week. There may also be weekly assignments posted that students will be expected to complete. (25% of grade)

Quantitative Research Design Paper: Students will develop a quantitative research design in the domain of psychology and describe it in written format (per handout distributed in the first two weeks of class). The paper will be due the last week of class, in APA format and approximately five to eight pages. As part of this assignment a brief outline and description will also be delivered online. (25% of grade)

Qualitative Research Design Online Presentation: Students will explore a qualitative research method and develop a research study on any subject within psychology using that method. These designs will be presented online to peers during the last two weeks of class, approximately five pages. (25% of grade)

Final Exam: To confirm students' comprehension and integration of course material, to be posted in the sixth week of class. (25% of grade)

Not reading the syllabus or online curriculum will not be considered a valid excuse for not knowing or fulfilling course expectations.

Library

All resources in Argosy University's online collection are available through the Internet. The campus librarian will provide students with links, user IDs, and passwords.

<u>Library Resources</u>: Argosy University's core online collection features nearly 21,000 full-text journals and 23,000 electronic books and other content covering all academic subject areas including Business & Economics, Career & General Education, Computers, Engineering & Applied Science, Humanities, Science, Medicine & Allied Health, and Social & Behavior Sciences. Many titles are directly accessible through the Online Public Access Catalog at http://library.argosyu.edu. In addition to online resources, Argosy University's onsite collections contain a wealth of subject-specific research materials searchable in the Online Public Access Catalog. Catalog searching is easily limited to individual campus collections. Alternatively, students can search combined collections of all Argosy University Libraries. Students are encouraged to seek research and reference assistance from campus librarians.

<u>Information Literacy</u>: Argosy University's Information Literacy Tutorial was developed to teach students fundamental and transferable research skills. The tutorial consists of five modules where students learn to select sources appropriate for academic-level research, search periodical indexes and search engines, and evaluate and cite information. In the tutorial, students study concepts and practice them through interactions. At the conclusion of each module, they can test their comprehension and receive immediate feedback.
