<u>Methods of Instruction</u> – This course will be delivered in a **blended format**, including in class lecture and discussion, video, and role-plays combined with online instruction. In addition to the two required weekends on campus, students are required to participate online via Embanet-Interlearn at <u>http://online.argosyu.edu</u> on a weekly basis during the entire term of the course. This course begins online the on **June 29**, meets on the weekends of **July 15 and 16** and **August 12 and 13**, and concludes on **August 19**.

Course Description

The purpose of this course will be to introduce students at a graduate level to the field of chemical dependency and substance abuse assessment and treatment with emphasis on the forensic setting. Often a criminal justice intervention is the catalyst that is motivating an individual to examine their substance abuse (for example driving or committing a

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crime while under the influence, possession or sell of drugs, or public intoxication) and treatment may be a condition required upon release. Understanding substance abuse

requires knowledge of drug action and effects, assessment of abuse versus addiction (as well as differentiating co-occurring mental disorders), referral options, and counseling treatment.

Course Objectives

• To gain a general understanding of the neurobiology and psychosocial aspects of drug and alcohol use, abuse and addiction

• To become familiar with the overdose and withdrawal potentials that can arise with both substance use and addiction

• To explore the various models and theories of addiction

• To explore treatment options and appropriate treatment planning.

• To explore the issue of relapse prevention and to learn specific strategies to aid in the prevention of relapse

Content Areas and Schedule

The course format consists of weekly contact. This means that in addition to the weekend dates, you will be required to log on one time per week via Argosy's Embanet website and post responses to weekly discussion topics based on readings and other course material, as will be discussed below.

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reading by posting onto the discussion board. Online assignments will be specified by

email or online by the start (Monday) of each week. Please note that there will be an assignment posted on June 29 for the first week of classes.

You will be asked to attend an AA or NA meeting by the **first** weekend class. Having some familiarity (if you don't have so already) with these programs allows for an overall effectiveness to your clinical skills. You do not need to participate in the meetings, but I would like for you to observe the dynamics that occur. Note your feelings about having to attend a meeting, your feelings/thoughts during the meeting, and note the interactions of the community in attendance. You will be asked to discuss your experience in class, but you don't have to hand in any formal paper.

There will be a paper due on the last weekend class (August 13). This paper will be 5-8 pages, APA format. Research an area in chemical dependency or substance use that you are interested in and want to know more about. Some ideas would be to focus on a particular drug type (cocaine, alcohol, narcotics, designer drugs) and why this particular drug is of interest to you. Or you can explore a style of addiction counseling intervention that you would use with your client and why. A popular topic of debate in substance abuse is the harm reduction model- discuss your views as to whether this model allows for "recovery". Please use at least 3 citations from books and/or journals.

Please let me know your topic of interest by July 21.

There will be a final exam on the last weekend class. This exam will consist of true/false, multiple choice and some short answer type of questions.

WEEKEND ONE: JULY 15 AND 16

Students will be asked to discuss their experience of attending an AA/NA meeting.

Vignettes will be given and we will discuss how to address legal/ethical issues with clients dealing with substance abuse issues.

Videos pertaining to substance abuse will be viewed and discussion to follow.

WEEKEND TWO: AUGUST 12 AND 13

Students will be asked to present their papers. Final exam
